Qualifying Seal Requirements

Eligibility for the State Seal of Civics Literacy:

- Students must complete all requirements during grades 9-12.
- Students must complete all social studies courses with an overall grade point average (GPA) of 3.0 out of a 4.0 scale. <u>Verification Form</u>, signed by counselor of grade on AP exam and other coursework for eligibility
- Students must pass the <u>Arizona State Civics Exam</u>. (Graduating class of 2026 will need a passing score of 70% or better)
- Students must complete activities from each of the 4 categories.
 - Category 1 Civic Learning Program
 - Category 2 Civic Engagement Activities
 - Category 3 Service Learning and/or Community Service Activities
 - Category 4 Written Reflection of Program
- It is recommended you select and meet with a mentor teacher to assist you through this process.

Documentation required to earn this seal:

Please read the following four Categories carefully and refer back to them often to ensure all components are included. Each category has a specific number of requirements.

Service Learning or Community Service Activities These activities must be completed outside of the school day. The menu of options are as follows: (Choose One)	 public agency or charitable organization that serves the public good. (A signed copy of service hours is required) Enlistment in any branch of the United States Military (Air Force, Army, Coast Guard, Marines, Navy, Space Force) before graduation meets this requirement. Verification Log, signed by mentor/teacher for out of school programs
Category 4: Reflection <i>(Required)</i>	Written reflection on the personal experiences earning the Arizona State Seal of Civic Literacy. (refer to included rubric for guidance)

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District Documentation Requirements

- Students should submit all evidence of work in the form of a Google Presentation. It is recommended that the presentation should be reviewed by a mentor teacher prior to sharing with the Social Studies Curriculum Specialist, Lynn Hoppes, by April 1, 2023. The District Seals Committee will review and make recommendations of awardees.
- The SlideShow should be titled with the student's First and Last Name, the initials of the High School they attend, and Seal of Civics Literacy Applicant (Ex: Lynn Hoppes, PVHS, Seal of Civics Literacy Applicant).
- Each of the four categories should have a slide or multiple slides dedicated to each choice and brief explanation of what was your role or how the requirement was met. Document all expectations as explained in the checklist. Forms which require a signature can be scanned and linked.
- The Reflection Rubric will be utilized to determine eligibility for the Seal. Students will be notified of the Seal status by May 1st, 2023.
